

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

### **Executive Summary**

The Head Start Community Assessment was done in 2013. It is updated annually for changes including homelessness, increased availability of public funded pre-K (assessment of how it meets needs of parents and children and whether it is full day), shifts in community demographics and resources.

The numbers of eligible children 0-5 is in debate as is the population of the Reservation. The numbers range from 3618 (HUD Estimates) to about 2850 adding the 2016 Child Find stats. Whatever the number when we looked at all the Child Care programs on the Reservation there are only about 963 children 0-5 receiving some form of preschool.

In terms of homeless there are few children termed homeless according to Mckinney-Vento but many according to the Oglala Sioux Tribe definition. There are many children living in overcrowded or unhealthy conditions.

The Oglala Sioux Tribe Child Protection Program is getting reorganized. There is a shortage of foster homes both on and off the Reservation. Many parents from the Pine Ridge Reservation are moving to Rapid City and getting in trouble with the child welfare system. On and off the Reservation meth and vodka are both epidemic.

OLC Head Start is part of a collaborative group of early childhood sevice providers and we are hoping to get more accurate figures for our 5 Year Community Assessment we have scheduled to be finished in December 2017. The group is also discussing why we cannot fill all the slots available in Head Start/Early Head Start as well as other preschool programs.

April of 2016 we did a Reservation wide child find throughout our communities. Some of the families were home and it was raining so we could not get out to some of the families due to roads. However, we visited 349 homes on that day April 15, 2016 to try to gauge how many children we had in our communities who were HS/EHS age and prenatal. Our goal is to do this once a year. I also got statistics from I.H.S with child files they have in medical records of children 0-5.

Two interesting factors we realized from the child find event was

- 1. Many of the homes the parent(s) were still asleep at 10-11 am. The children answered the door
- 2. We have about 80 children who live in very rural country areas that we cannot get too. Due to the one hour time frame for buses and un maintained roads to these home.

### A. Homeless Children

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There is a homeless count done each year in January by Housing but due to the culture there are few people counted as homeless using the regular government definition. Relatives or friends take people in. There is a great deal of overcrowding in houses and a great housing shortage. The Oglala Sioux Tribe has passed a definition of homeless (OSTXB 12-11) that includes other government regulations and also that anyone is considered homeless if the head of household of a family is not on the lease or title.

We will work on getting an accurate count for the 5 year Community Assessment in December 2017.

# B. Children in foster care OST Child Protection 867-5752 Lisa/Jennifer

We attempted to get numbers and were given the number 241 (3/29/17) in the system. The Tribe also deals with many Indian Child Welfare Act cases of member living off the Reservation whose children are taken away and put in foster care.

We have 46 kids in foster care and 26 are under the age of five. We had 358 investigations last year and we have 231 families in case management

### C. Children with Disabilities

The OST Early Intervention Program (Stephanie Loudon 867-5712) provides full-screening IEPs, and referrals for services for children 0-5 on the Reservation. The two public school systems (Bennett County and Oglala Lakota County) also provide Special Ed Services in their areas. We will get more accurate information for the full Community Assessment in December 2017.

Oglala Lakota College provides a stable and well managed grantee.

We contacted the Oglala Sioux Tribe Research Board and obtained copies of over 100 studies done on Pine Ridge (Attached RRB). We will be able to contact the authors for research that is relevant to the Head Start program (RRB Katie Blindman 867-1705 ext 211 ost.rrb16@gmail.com).

We also sent information needed for Head Start to the One Nation One Number reservation-wide survey being done by the Oglala Sioux Tribe to get accurate population numbers and other relevant information.
